During our most recent bash this past June, we had an informal fleet of nine sailboats moving up the coast. We didn't plan to make this journey together, it just sort of happened as we quickly coalesced into a team, sharing weather information and looking out for each other.

Our group was the first to discover a 65-foot ketch on the rocks at Cabo San Lazaro. We called this situation into both the Mexican and U.S. Coast Guard Search and Rescue Coordination Centers. It was nice to receive Good Samaritan kudos, but even nicer to learn the three people on board were okay.

Also, during a weather layover in Bahia Santa Maria we met an Oregon family who was about to head home via the Clipper Route — supposedly used to go north in the 1800s by the square-riggers whose capability to make progress to windward was limited — on their very seaworthy 30-foot sailboat, *Ka-Em-Ta*. Our new friends were in need of a barometer to assist them in undertaking this journey, so we gladly gave them an extra one we had on board. In return, they presented us with 24 cinnamon rolls, which were quickly consumed. We were sad to learn their boat sustained rudder damage and began taking on water after striking a submerged object about 630 miles southwest of San Diego. While they were rescued by a passing Chinese freighter, their wonderful sailboat sank.

I find truth in the anonymous quote, that kindness, like a boomerang, always returns. Mary and I feel fortunate to have made many wonderful friends at BCYC, and many of you pay it forward with kindness. Thank you all.

## *Isthmus Rendezvous*

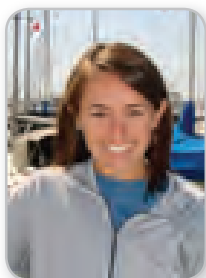

We are now fully immersed in the fall sailing season. If you thought junior racing was over after the summer, you have not experienced the best events on the Southern California racing calendar. Our BCYC team has been busy, sailing the Fall Gold Cup at Newport Harbor Yacht Club, the Fall Invitational at Alamitos Bay Yacht Club, C420 Perry Series, CFJ Shadden Series, and the sixth annual Corinthian Cup Regatta hosted by BCYC. They will continue racing right up to the Thanksgiving holiday. Look for us on the water on Friday and Sunday afternoons as we have increased our practice schedule significantly and it seems to be paying off with a great victory at Gold Cup, Fall Invitational, and Corinthian Cup – BCYC juniors have been accomplishing great things in local regattas.

The 2011 Corinthian Cup brought 97 entries including an outstanding number of new CFJ sailors from eight Southern California yacht clubs. The weather was sunny, and pleasant, but the lack of breeze proved challenging at times especially on the Sabot C2 and C3 course. Quite a few C3 sailors struggled to make it around the first windward mark due to a combination of lack of breeze and a strong outgoing tide. Both Saturday and Sunday the race committee hoped for the typical westerly, saw traces of it, but never got a steady breeze. Luckily our sailors are used to the light air and BCYC's Derek Pickell and Connor Chung were able to squeeze a victory in the CFJ class of nine competitors. Despite the light conditions, everyone had a great time and BCYC proved once again we host a fabulous regatta. The Corinthian Cup Perpetual Trophy, based on a high point scoring system, was won by NHYC. Now all of our junior sailors know who they have to beat to bring this trophy back home next year to this side of the bay.

## Sailing Log from Erik Lidecis, BCYC DRM



I've been campaigning my Finn this year on the West Coast and had a pretty successful season. I won several regattas out of Alamitos Bay Yacht Club including Memorial Day, Fourth of July, and Labor Day. I turned 40 this year and am now a Finn Master, and participated in the Finn North American Masters Regatta at Encinal Yacht Club. It was a combination of light- and medium-air racing on San Francisco Bay, and I wound up winning the regatta with six bullets out of nine races. The perpetual trophy is on display at BCYC until next year.

My boat speed is consistently getting better downwind, a weakness in the past. The learning curve on the Finn is steep. This is my third season, and after spending the greater part of the summer last year on San Francisco Bay prepping for the Gold Cup, I am much more comfortable in the boat. It is a very technical boat that demands physical conditioning. You have to be in great shape if you want to be fast.

In late July we had our California Championship on Huntington Lake in the high Sierras – what a great place to sail. We had 10-12 knots of breeze both days, and I won five of seven races, taking the championship. I

trained pretty hard in Long Beach this summer to get ready for the Finn National Championships, held in early September at ABYC. I was hoping for a top three finish. Zach Railey, U.S. Olympic silver medalist in 2008, and Caleb Paine, currently the second ranked American behind Zach, participated. Three days of racing in really light air showed that Zach was the best, winning all the races. I really struggled in the super light air, and fell way behind early. Thank goodness the breeze came up a bit on the last day, and I finished strong, giving Zach a bit of a chase in the last couple of races, finishing tied for fourth and a couple of points out of third place.

The local season is pretty much over. I am thinking seriously about going to Miami this winter to play against the big boys at the OCR regatta. The world's best racers will be there since 2012 is an Olympic year. It's always a great experience to sail against the very best!

Let's Go Fishing

United Anglers of Southern California and their legal team accomplished a major victory in California Superior Court, when the Marine Life Protective Act (MLPA) for Southern California was invalidated. Under the MLPA, most of our coastal waters would have been closed to fishing as of June, 2012. The court agreed that the California Department of Fish and Game Commission lacked the statutory authority to adopt such regulations. DFG is appealing the ruling.

A record-breaking blue marlin was caught recently in the Mexican waters around Cabo San Lucas. The behemoth weighed 1,213 pounds and took 28 hours to get on board the boat. This monster fish sounds like something from Ernest Hemingway's "The Old Man and the Sea." Serious fishermen typically head south at this time of the year in an attempt to catch the big one.
