Second place overall went to last year's first place winner, Captain Kip Cypress and Team *Kismet*, who followed by a mere 0.06 seconds. As the observer aboard *Kismet*, I was awarded the coveted Grand Mariner Cup Commodores' challenge award against Hollywood Yacht Club, the second year in a row. I mention this not only out of pride, but to show that our club members are responding to the 2009 Strategic Plan goal of revitalizing

club participation in predicted log events. Speaking of the Strategic Plan, our teams have had the 'pedal to the metal' in their focus areas, working toward producing a finished product later this year.

In other on-the-water events, a special thanks to Distinguished Racing Member Dan Rossen and crew for a ride on *Problem Child*, allowing me to accept the first annual Commodore's Challenge award in the PHRF division on behalf of BCYC during this year's Leukemia Cup Regatta.

Turning to the downstairs remodel, the City of Newport Beach has approved the last set of corrections that now allows us to clearly define the scope of work, helping the contractors to sharpen their pencils in their project bids. Once over this hurdle, we will announce when and what areas of the club will be impacted. Thanks to Director Bob Emmett and Allan Horowitz for their ongoing efforts to push this through to fruition.

The Membership Committee is gaining momentum in recruiting new members with two new Regular Flag members, one Junior Flag and one returning member approved by the Board of Directors at its last meeting, along with two new membership applications pending. The continuing support of current members in these efforts is greatly appreciated.

Honoring Commodore Emmi's 98th Birthday and Philanthropic Contributions



When James Emmi was born June 23, 1916, in Rochester, New York the president at that time was Woodrow Wilson. This was more than 10 years before Charles Lindbergh's solo flight (1927) and the stock market crash of 1929. In 1916, there was approximately one car per 50 people in the U.S. The first commercial radio station broadcast was in 1920.

Emmi has seen a lot of change in these 98 years.

As an adult, Commodore Emmi worked as an electrical engineer at a large aerospace company before moving into property management, eventually becoming president of Kimberly Development Company.

He joined BCYC in 1970, becoming commodore in 1977. Commodore Emmi purchased *Pele*, his 43' Swan sailboat, in Finland in 1978, and with a revolving crew from BCYC sailed in the Mediterranean, the Caribbean, through the Panama Canal and eventually back to Newport Beach. Between *Pele* and his previous *Islander 37*, Jim has participated in well over 100 ocean races. One of those races was the 1982 Transpac to Hawaii. Alongside skipper Emmi were six BCYC crew, including Joe and Grace Degenhardt. His latest race was BCYC's 125-mile Around the Island Race. He was 94 at the time. In 2007, he was awarded the Commodore Levy Perpetual Trophy as Staff Commodore of the Year. BCYC's race committee boat is named *EMMI* due to his generous contribution to the Bahia Sail Racing Association.

Jim is a member of the Chapman University Board of Trustees. He has served on the Pacific Symphony Board of Trustees since 1990, in various capacities, including president and vice president of development.

Together with Catherine, the Emmi's extensive philanthropic involvement has included education, health care, the arts and science. A partial list of organizations include UC Berkeley College of Engineering, Caltech, Oregon Tech, New Jersey Institute of Technology, Purdue University, MIND Research Institute, Mission San Juan Capistrano, Hoag Hospital, Newport Harbor Nautical Museum, Opera Pacific, American Symphony Orchestra League, Segerstrom Center for the Arts, Girls Inc., Newport Beach Performing Arts Theatre Foundation, Newport Beach Public Library, Orange County Museum of Art, Act Today and, let's not forget, BCYC. During BCYC's early years, commodores such

as Jim Emmi helped the club meet their monthly financial obligations through personal loans.

Emmi engineering scholarships have been provided to students at more than a dozen major universities. The Emmis are also currently matching donations to the Pacific Symphony Orchestra as part of the Emmi Challenge Program.

The Emmis were selected by Chapman University for the 2013 Citizen of the Year Award. They were alongside acclaimed actor Richard Dreyfuss who received an Achievement in the Arts Award at the same event.

BCYC staff commodores and the board of directors will celebrate Commodore Emmi's 98th birthday at their quarterly meeting July 12. Happy Birthday, Commodore.

Marlin Adventure

White sea bass are still running sporadically off Catalina Island and there has been some mention of them off Dana Point. The waters are getting warmer off the coast – currently 67 degrees, and yellow tail are starting to make an appearance. Some forecasts indicate we might experience El Niño conditions this year, which means that the waters will most likely be warmer than normal off the Southern California coast. The warmer water will kill some of the kelp, which will break off and start to float. Under those kelp paddies may be anchovies and below that might be mackerel and yellow tail, then dorado and marlin — the complete food chain. Kelp paddies are a good place to make bait (catching mackerel) if you have a bait tank.

When you have live bait on board and you see a marlin, you might try to cast to the fish, somewhat tricky with a conventional reel. One could always put the live bait in the water and let him swim while paying out the line. The advantage of trolling, usually at seven to eight knots, is that you get to keep moving while looking for kelp paddies or fins.

Also, there are all types of lures to troll with, called dragging plastic. Some are made specifically for marlin, but that's not to say that dorado or tuna won't hit those also. When fishing for marlin, you will want to be in water that is at least 68 degrees. You will need to find the banks or high spots in the ocean floor or work the canyons. At these different locations you will find the bait near the surface, which will bring up the mackerel, and below that will be the game fish. When laying out your lures, you want to make them look like a school of fish. Two should be closer to the boat (35-40 feet) and two would be about 50 yards behind the ones in front, all somewhat staggered. The color of the water is also important – look for deep blue water. The idea is that the fish will hear the prop wash (also called harmonics), look up and see your lures. If you hold your mouth just right, you could get lucky! Good luck fishing.

Once again, I am proposing a fishing trip, this time for marlin. You will be part of a catch-and-release tournament, Sept. 4-6, which supports charitable causes. You would board my boat, *Kismet*, in Avalon and fish all three days. You will need to get your own transportation to Avalon along with your lodging. You may submit a bid by email to kipcyprus@aol.com, and I will take the five highest bidders on this adventure. Your donations are tax deductible.

The Orange Flag

The orange flag on the Race Committee boat indicates one end of the start line (and in most cases, one end of the finish line). Race Committee personnel “sight” the line between the orange flag on the committee boat and another orange flag anchored some distance to port (left). They watch for boats crossing the line early and, later, for boats finishing.

Crossing the start line early in a race is an obvious no-no, but planning for a good start is always okay. In fact, now is a very good time to plan for racing later this year and in 2015.

Good Things Take Time, Part Two

At the time this article was written in early June, the club finally has all the city approvals to get a building permit for the lower level renovation. Currently, our team is working with our architect and selected contractor to “value engineer” the project to bring costs in line with guidance from the Board of Directors. If the board approves a budget in July, I expect demolition to begin in mid-to-late August, with completion well before the Christmas activities.

The House Committee has received approval from the board for an upgrade of club WiFi services. We have received several complaints of poor service from members with boats at the outside edges of the marina. Director Larry Fortmuller explored several solutions with the club’s network supplier. With a viable plan for better coverage of the marina, the committee felt it was also time to add service in the multi-purpose and junior rooms as well. The upgrade should be completed by early July.

The next committee meeting will be July 17 at 7:30 p.m. All members interested in improving the club’s facilities are encouraged to attend.


