Junior Sailing Hits the Road

This time of year it is easy to tell the difference between the fair weather and the toughest sailors. As mild as our winter is here in Newport Beach, our newer racers still tend to get involved in activities other than sailing. In other areas of the country this is what they call “frostbite” season. Regattas usually involve a short day of racing and a warm cup of anything. In Southern California it may just mean grabbing a spray jacket and a hat before we hit the water. Therefore, our regatta schedule is quite busy. We will begin traveling to away regattas in early March and will not slow down until Memorial Day. Then we will have a slow month before we begin our even busier summer sailing season.

This spring, our race team plans to travel to many local regattas. The major Sabot regattas include the North Series in San Diego, Sabot Midwinter at Newport Harbor Yacht Club, Manning at Alamitos Bay Yacht Club, Spring Gold Cup at NHYC and finally, Leukemia Cup right here at home. We would love to see more BCYC double-handed participation in some of the local CFJ and C420 regattas. We had great success last fall and look forward to excellent results in these upcoming events.

Besides a busy regatta schedule, BCYC Junior Sailing has taken some time to head out into the community to present the joy of sailing to a group of at-risk youths at a local elementary school. Head Coach Cameron Maclaren and I had the privilege of presenting a lesson on wind, using an actual Naples Racing Sabot, to roughly 130 students. Many of these kids have never been to the ocean, let alone seen an actual sailboat up close. The students had the opportunity to assist with rigging the boat, as well as practice two of the most important knots for racers, 8-knot and bowline. Finally, we allowed kids to sit in the Sabot and practice trimming and easing the sail. It was an amazing experience and the kids had a fantastic time, but most importantly, they were able to apply their experiences later in the classroom during a science class.

Finding Mojo

A major challenge in youth sailing is the repetition. From age seven until high school, it's typical for junior sailors in Southern California to spend all of their time in just two boats, the Sabot and CFJ, and in four venues: Newport Beach, Alamitos Bay, Mission Bay and San Diego. While practice does make perfect, racing the same regatta, in the same boat, against the same competitors, year after year can really damage one's mojo. To combat this, a junior sailor must seek out new boats and new venues. I was first able to do this by sailing an Optimist, which took me to points north, including San Pedro, Santa Barbara and San Francisco. Max and Jake Mayol took over from there and have competed throughout the United States and Europe.

Looking ahead, we're excited to see a really special boat fast becoming one of the hottest classes in youth sailing globally – the 29er skiff. In January, Max, Jake, and I were hosted by Max Brill at Mission Bay Yacht Club, who showed us the ropes on his 29er, and the following week we sailed with BCYC's Eric and Dillon Graveline on their new 29er. This boat is like nothing we've sailed before – it's a unique package consisting of a 150-pound hull, an asymmetrical spinnaker, crew trapeze, and a myriad of controls that take some time to perfect. Reportedly, the 29er can reach speeds of over 20 knots! Needless to say, all of us who sailed in these boats have found our mojo again and are looking forward to building a campaign through BCYC. I will report back our results during the year.

There are only three months to go before the Turtle Rally... not a race... a sailing event. Sail to Two Harbors in a flotilla. Party till you drop!

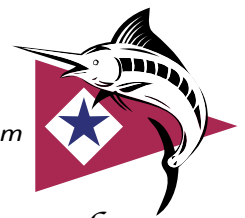

Be Prepared

Many of us like to fish and sail in Mexican waters – you need to be aware of regulations and requirements. There has been a great deal of publicity recently about boats being impounded in Mexico, and while there appears to be some improvement in the situation, it is important that you are prepared with correct and complete documentation any time you take your boat to Mexico. You must have a valid Temporary Import Permit (TIP) for any boat over 15 feet. Cost is \$50 and is good for 10 years. Also, all crew are required to have a Tourist Entry Form (FMT) – cost is \$23 per person. These documents can be obtained prior to leaving the United States. One source in Newport Beach is Romero's Mexico Service (949-548-8931). Another source of information can be found at mexonline.com/boatmex.htm.

If you go to Mexico without these forms you will need to proceed to the first port of entry, Ensenada. Fito Espinoza, dockmaster at Hotel Coral Marina, will assist you in filling out everything in his office. Then a driver will take you to the immigration office and the port captain and his staff will assist with all the paper work. Make certain you have vessel ownership title, a document that shows that the vessel's owner resides in a foreign country, and a credit card. If your ownership title shows a hull identification number, be sure that number matches the one marked on the vessel (can be found on outside starboard transom). If your ownership document shows an entity (LLC, Corporation), you will need the tax ID number, proof of payment of taxes, and your apostilled formation documents (i.e., Articles of Incorporation or Articles of Organization). While this is how I have always taken care of this paperwork when taking my boat into Mexico, you can always get the TIP and FMT before starting your trip to Mexico.

Keep in mind that if you have any fishing equipment on board your boat, even if you are not using it, everyone on the boat must have a current Mexican fishing license. Be prepared – your trip, and the fishing, will be very enjoyable

The Peggy Slater Memorial Award is presented annually to a female involved in the sport of sailing who best demonstrates outstanding contributions to the enhancement of women's sailing or individual achievement in the sport of sailing. BCYC is proud of Mary and her many outstanding achievements and notable contributions over the years. Mary now joins 24 top Southern California female sailors who have received this award since the first recipient, Gail Hine, received it in 1990.



Mary has also served SCYA in various capacities over the years, including SCYA commodore in 2006. Her leadership accomplishments have provided an example and beacon to woman sailors over many years. She is an inspirational and effective mentor to all she comes in contact with. She is a natural leader of the highest order, selfless in her contribution to help others benefit and grow.

Mary distinguished herself as the Regatta Chair of US Sailing's 2013 Junior Women's Double Handed Championship for the Ida Lewis trophy (JWDC.) The JWDC was a tremendous success, bringing 78 top female junior sailors from around the country to the coastal waters of Newport Beach. Mary's duties as chair of the 2013 JWDC spanned over 18 months and culminated in a nearly flawless execution of the regatta. As regatta chair, she provided leadership oversight of promotion, registration, housing, race committee and operations, transportation logistics, food, safety and medical procedures, awards and sponsorship. The regatta was an unparalleled success, bringing national attention and focus to sailing by young women. Many of the participants, having attended this event at other venues in the country in previous years, expressed amazement and gratitude about the venue, the food and organization of the event, a tribute to what Mary set into motion and guided to a very successful national-level racing event.

Mary started boating when she and her husband, Bob, joined Bahia Corinthian Yacht Club in 1989. Mary sailed competitively as a PHRF racer for many years. Mary is currently the owner of the Harbor 20, Rascal II, and has sailed with merit in Newport Harbor for over five years in Harbor 20 Fleet 1. Mary has also sailed as a crew member and skipper in WORSAs regattas from 1990 – 1997 and as a crew member in the Linda Elias Women's One Design Regatta.

Mary has served with distinction in many capacities at the Bahia Corinthian Yacht Club and became the commodore in 1999. She served as BCYC's second female commodore and mentored many women in leadership positions at BCYC. She was awarded BCYC's Woman of the Year Award in 1992, 2012 and 2013, and also received the Outstanding Service to the Club Award at BCYC in 2013.

Bahia Corinthian Yacht Club thanks and congratulates Mary for her many years of service to our club. We are proud of Mary and are fortunate to have her among our ranks.


Soul Mate


