Rejuvenated, that's the key word for our June lunch attendees. Thanks to Gail Cyprus for taking all the great photos this year to share!

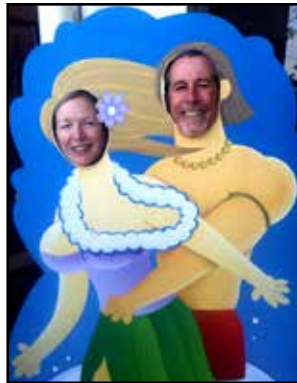

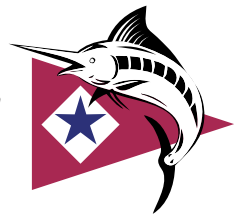

Some of our activities involve having the right number of materials or FOOD for all the members attending; we want to make sure we have enough for you too. Most importantly, we want to make sure you make it to the cruise! We have had a couple of cruises in the past that have made it to the "wait list" level. For various reasons, we need to draw a line at a saturation point. So sign up and don't miss the boat!

Pound Test Line



While sitting in the Columbia Room enjoying a cold beverage with some members, the question came up about what pound test line you should use when fishing. There seems to be a misconception that whatever size fish you are going after, you should have the same pound test line as the weight of the fish.

Depending on the experience of the angler, the lighter the line, the more you will need to work the fish. Working the fish means you set your drag looser so the fish can take the line. If you set it too tight, the 20-pound fish could break the line if the pound test limit is too light. If you are going out for the first time locally, and you are fishing for bottom fish in the 10- to 20-pound range, 15-pound test line would be plenty. An experienced angler could land a 150-pound game fish with only 20-pound test line. By setting the drag loose, the angler can land the fish if he can tire the fish out, before he tires himself out! For larger game fish in local waters, 30- to 50-pound test is plenty.

Here is a tip - if you see your rod bent way over and there is no line paying out, you will most likely lose the fish. The solution is to loosen the drag and retrieve line when possible. Good luck fishing.

Famous Races

July is a banner month for famous races.

The *Chicago to Mackinac* race, first run in 1898, is a 333 mile sprint from Chicago to Mackinac Island. *The Transpac Race*, first run in 1906, is a short 2,560 mile run from San Pedro to Honolulu.

And...the *Newport (RI) Regatta*, one of the premier one-design events in the United States, expects more than 200 entries. Imagine the following fleets competing at the same time: 12 Metre, 505, 2.4mR, 49er, A Class Cat, Byte CII, Comet, Ensign, Etchell, F-18, FD, J/22, J/24, J/70, Laser Full, Laser Radial, Melges 20, Melges 32, Skud, Sonar, Star, Sunfish, Swan 42, Viper 640 and VX One. Talk about a busy Race Committee – yikes!

Finally, closer to home, the world-famous *Angelman Races*, first introduced in 1970, are rapid-fire windward/leeward races, run monthly from June through August. While distance races test navigation and endurance, windward/leeward races test crew coordination. Many sail changes offer lots of opportunity for “messing up” and good crews are worth their weight in rum.

Speaking of crews, I'm happy to report that our Crew List continues to grow. Four local skippers are looking for crew. If you're thinking about getting into racing, this is the time to do it. Another way to get on a boat is to stop by post-race on Taco Tuesdays. I'll introduce you to the audience of skippers.
